FEATURED SPEAKERS

David Coon, PhD is the Associate Dean, Research Initiatives, Support, & Engagement and Professor Edson College of Nursing & Health Innovation at ASU. After receiving his PhD from Stanford University, he was the Associate Director of the Older Adult Center of the VA Palo Alto Health Care System and the Stanford University School of Medicine and Research Scientist at UCSF/Mt. Zion Institute on Aging. Dr. Coon designs and evaluates interventions, such as CarePRO and EPIC, that focus on culturally diverse groups of midlife and older adults facing chronic illnesses (e.g., dementia, cancer, depression) and their family caregivers. In addition, he and his community partners received The Rosalynn Carter Institute's 2013 National Leadership Award in Caregiving for CarePRO as well as the ASU President's Medal for Social Embeddedness.

David Weidman, MD is a Neurologist, dementia specialist and researcher at the Stead Family Memory Center at Banner Alzheimer's Institute. Dr. Weidman previously served as research director at NNS Clinical Research in Tucson, Arizona. He also was a private practice neurologist with a special interest in dementia. Currently, his focus is on caring for people with Alzheimer's disease and the development of new treatments.

Flor Olivos is the Tribal Ombudsman Specialist for the Inter Tribal Council of Arizona Inc. Area Agency on Aging Region 8. She has 5+ years of experience being a Certified Nursing Assistant and has worked for the Foundation for Senior Living, several retirement homes, and Adelante Healthcare. Ms. Olivos has worked with other agencies to coordinate need based referrals. Many of those communities include Tribes and small towns located throughout Arizona.

Helle Brand, PA In my original work as a physical therapist, I witnessed regularly the power of the mind-body-spirit connection, the healing forces people have within them and that I bring to the table as well. I then chose a new path as a physician assistant, where I could further my understanding of, and talents as a healer, and develop my love of working with the elderly, and specifically those with dementias. I moved from upstate New York, where I had lived for almost 40 years to Phoenix to help develop the program and services at Banner Alzheimer's Institute, where I worked for 11 years, moving then to do Memory Care work in Utah. But now returned to Arizona to help develop the Banner Alzheimer's Institute program in Tucson. The path has been twisted, the rewards great. My friends will tell you that the move has been a good one, for they have all noted lightness in me!
